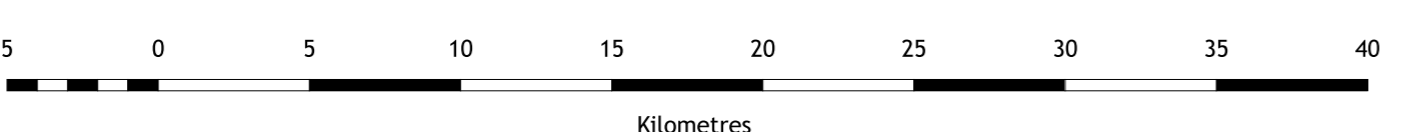


GANARASKA HIKING TRAIL

The GANARASKA Hiking Trail is a 500 kilometre recreational trail extending from Port Hope on Lake Ontario to the Bruce Trail near Glen Huron, with branches extending to Wasaga Beach and Midland. Nine member clubs offer hikes in their local area and club volunteers maintain the recreational trail system for all to enjoy. The trail is available only because of the generosity of landowners, both private and public, who have given permission to establish the trail on their land.

The trail goes through rolling farmlands and woods, follows quiet country roads and travels through small towns and villages. The southern part of the trail consists of the Pine Ridge and the Kawartha sections. The northern part of the trail consists of the Orillia, Barrie, Mad River, Midland, Tiny, Oro-Medonte and Wasaga Beach sections. The Wilderness section of the GANARASKA Hiking Trail, which connects the southern and northern parts, is unique and passes through the Queen Elizabeth II Wildlands Provincial Park. It is on the Precambrian Shield and has very rugged terrain.

The GANARASKA Hiking Trail Association Inc. acknowledges that the GANARASKA Hiking Trail passes through the traditional territories of the Anishinaabek, Wendat-Huron, and Haudenosaunee nations.
